Dear friends,

This should take about 10-15 minutes. After that we'll have the potluck and then whatever people would like to share about Terry. The Greater Seder group, the Kosher Hammies, will sing a song that Lynn Heller wrote for this celebration, as Terry often did for special occasions. Other live music will be provided by Wind That Shakes the Barley (Kathie Aagaard, Sarah Mitchell, and Bill Dudley) and friends. There will be friends of Terry's from her fencing group, her international folk dance group, her Israeli dance group, her contradance group, her Kosher Ham group, and others! Terry's friend, Valerie Peters, will be sending a slideshow with pictures of Terry. If you can, please go to our Facebook page, Remembering Terry Abrahams, and upload pictures to Google Drive for the slide show. Jennifer Velt, a friend of Terry's from the Israeli Dance group, is planning on doing a Zoom after the celebration (maybe in June) for people who are unable to attend. Rande will be videoing the formal parts of the celebration and putting it on the Facebook page, too.

Everyone has been asked to bring a dish to share. We already have plastic utensils, paper plates, napkins, and will have coolers with ice and water and some sodas, so please do not plan to bring those things. We will have a designated table or tables to place your dishes to share.

OIFDC by Pat Henderson



NFO Conference and HEK Workshop by Pat Henderson

After three years in the making, the NFO Conference in conjunction with Hora Eclipse 2 and Kochavim 2024 (HEK) was this international and Israeli dancer's paradise. The dates were April 4-9 with the total eclipse of the sun happening for over 4 minutes on Monday, April 8 at 1:37pm. The weather forecast was for clouds and storms but somehow, we witnessed the clouds clearing at the most important moments—a miracle. The location was the Greene Family Camp in Bruceville, Texas which is about an hour and a half north of Austin. This is the location of the Texas International Folk Dance Camp that happens every Thanksgiving and NFO used the dance floor that was built by the Texas dancers and is stored at the camp. This sprung wood dance floor was set up in the large cafeteria and the tables where we ate were around its perimeter. All the attendees of NFO and HEK ate at the same time. There were 18 of us from Florida but there were probably more than that since I did not know many at HEK. There were about 280 in attendance with all the groups.

After dinner on Thursday, we had our first dance party. Roo Lester had contacted leaders from groups all over the country to preprogram their favorite dances. The only rule was that you could not duplicate a dance that was planned by the live music for the evening. Jaap Leegwater and his accordionist, Filip Filipov were the live music on Thursday night. Bobby and I were on the Thursday night team for the music. In fact, we started dancing

with our first set and I led the first dance, Hora Veche! Several Texas bands played on the other evenings. Special guest musician, Loretta Kelly played her fiddle one evening. The dance party on Monday night was special since many HEK

dancers attended including Israel Yakovee, an Israeli choreographer.

The conference membership meeting was Friday morning. Committee reports were presented and then we had elections. Greg Lund was elected President-Elect and will work with Cricket the following year and take the gavel next year. Jeanette Geslison was elected Vice-President Taunya Lund was elected Treasurer and Rob McCullom was elected Secretary. New board members are: Linda Bernfeld, Jacqui Horwitz, Eileen Hug, and Pat Henderson. The meeting was streamed via Zoom thanks to a fantastic tech team.

Then Friday afternoon was the first dance workshop with Jaap. That was followed by 100 years of Israeli Dancing with Dit and Bob Olshan with Joan Hantman. There was a slideshow to show how Israeli dance developed over the decades and then we did a dance from that decade. They were followed by the Heritage Awards ceremony. The Heritage Awards were presented to: Ping Chun, Dena & Franklin Houston, Loretta Kelley, and Don Weeda. Service Awards to NFO went to: Kathy Bruni, Jo Crawford and Roo Lester. Certificates of Appreciation were awarded to: Pat Henderson & Bobby Quibodeaux, Murray & Randi Spiegel, Henry Temchin & Sue-Ellen Flescher, Melissa Miller & Lew Smith and Holly Plotner. This was a complete surprise and it was great to share the spotlight with Henry and Sue-Ellen as Floridians!

Following the awards, we had a Shabbat dinner where most wore white. We blessed the food and had our challah bread and wine. The dancing started with HEK doing a mixer with a grand march followed by Bala, an Israeli mixer and then the Czech mixer Doublebska Polka. So with this initial mixing of all the groups, the great weekend of dancing continued. The international dance parties were in the Dining Hall and the HEK dancers were in the Performing Arts Center for their night parties. They had rented their wooden floor from a company in Tampa, Florida! At least 15 NFO registrants also attended HEK sessions.

We started Saturday with a Jaap dance workshop followed by his Culture Corner about his collecting Bulgarian dances from the villages. Then Franklin Houston had a workshop on classic dances. In the afternoon, Larry Denenberg gave a lecture on eclipse basics. Then Melissa Miller and Lew Smith gave a Balkan dance workshop on identifying dances by their rhythm. Then special guest, Loretta Kelley, lectured on the Hardanger fiddle. Afterward, there was an Israeli dance workshop for international dancers. After dinner, there was a campfire with s'mores and a singalong which included Havdallah, the service that concludes Shabbat.

Sunday programs began with Bobi Ashley discussing Pourparler and how attendees share teaching methods of song and dance with each other. It is part of NFO. Then Jaap and Filip had another Bulgarian dance session which was followed by an astronomy presentation by Judit Gjorgyey Ries called Sundial to

Modern Timekeeping. After lunch, Larry Denenburg gave an advanced eclipse lecture. Then Jaap and Filip had their last Bulgarian dance workshop. Franklin and Dena Houston set the tone for the evening with the teaching of Texas Roadhouse dances which were all couple dances and steps ranging from the

Cajun two step to the polka. White plastic small tables were set up on the perimeter of the dance floor and pretzels and salsa and chips were put on the tables to resemble a roadhouse. A Texas band made up mostly of folk dancers played for awhile before dinner. Keeping the Texas theme, we had a delicious BBQ dinner with chicken and corn on the cob. During the dance parties that night, there was a planned stargazing session with an astronomer.

Monday was eclipse day so no dancing until our party at night. The daytime activities started with a



class on making origami stars. Then Murray and Randi Spiegel had a session called Eclipse Games where a person had to identify a sound or song. The last lecture about the eclipse was given by Nancy Morrison. Lunch was served on paper plates and off we went to see the eclipse which started at 12:19pm.

Totality started at 1:37pm and lasted more than 4 minutes. We were given the proper glasses for viewing the sun directly. The crowd cheered every time the clouds let the sun and moon peek through. Most people took a chair from the dining hall outside to a large cement area outside. It made it a lot easier

to look up. A couple of homemade inventions showing the eclipse made the event more interesting. A broadcast from NASA was on a large screen in the dining hall during the eclipse. It was a surreal day and we saw together the event which joined three different groups together at a great location.

After the eclipse was over, Joan Hantman talked about Israeli dance teacher certification. Then the conference wrap-up session happened where we could give the pluses and minuses of this year's conference and give us ideas as we plan for next year's in the spring in Portland, Oregon.



HEK was officially over after the eclipse but their attendees could pay to stay an extra night so they joined us for the last dance party Monday night. It was a wonderful international and Israeli party with some live music. This spectacular event was such a success that it will be hard to beat in the future.
