Terry Abrahams Celebration of Life - May 19, 2024

Terry's family organized a beautiful Celebration of Life for Terry in Tampa in May. It was held at an outdoor pavilion at Lowry

Park. About 15 members of our international folk dance community were there.

The official program started with a blessing from Terry's brother-in-law, Rabbi Jim. He said the Mourner's Kaddish and El Malay Rachamim and explained what the prayers are, as many people who are coming were not Jewish. Following that were remembrances given by friends of all the groups who were lucky to have Terry as a member... her fencing group, her international dance group, her Israeli dance group, her contradance group, her Kosher Ham group, her pickle ball group, and others! Terry's sister spoke also. Trying to encompass Terry's life into speeches – could not do it justice, but it was heartwarming/overwhelming to hear all that

Terry did. Both Pat H and Gary spoke for the FFDC (note: see other article for Pat H's tribute). The Greater Seder group, the Kosher Hammies, sung a song that Lynn Heller wrote for this celebration,



something Terry often did for special occasions (Note: see song lyrics elsewhere).

Following the program, everyone partook in the amazing potluck lunch. Attendees had brought a plethora of delicious food to share.

After lunch, the live music started. The Wind That Shakes the Barley (members are Kathie Aagaard, Sarah Mitchell and Bill Dudley) and friends played a variety of songs. It was now that the FFDC members started dancing. It was tight between picnic tables

and support posts, but it was still special.

Terry's family brought many tchotchkes that Terry had accumulated over her lifetime. A broad collection of ethnic and other items she had collected from her travels. These were spread out over the tables and attendees were urged to take home with them to have a memory of Terry.

All in all, it was a lovely tribute to Terry highlighting the impact she had on our lives.

Terry Abrahams - Obituary

September 23, 1936 – May 02, 2024

Theresa Jean Kaplan Abrahams was born in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, on September 23, 1936. She grew up in Pueblo and Boulder, Colorado, and Champaign, Illinois. She attended the elite University High School in Urbana, Illinois, and then graduated from the University of Illinois after finishing her senior year at Washington University in St. Louis.

She married Joseph Abrahams in 1957. They had four daughters, Deborah Helene, Elaine Michelle, Patricia Louise, and Susan Lynn. They lived in Topeka, Kansas, and Toledo, Ohio, then moved to Tampa in 1977. Terry is survived by her four daughters, three grandchildren, nine great-grandchildren, a few cousins, and her sister, Marcia Kaplan Rudin.

She had several jobs until she retired, ranging from social work to legal office temping. She was very adventurous, traveling all over the world. She also loved folk dancing, pickleball, and fencing (she won the nationals and participated in the World Fencing Championships).

She enjoyed writing musical comedies for her Tampa synagogue Congregation Schaarai Zedek and the Tampa JCC. She especially loved writing song lyrics and performing in many of The Kosher Hams' annual Greater Seders. She also designed t-shirts and produced and sold buttons under the name "Tampa Bay Buttoneers" for her friends and their special events.

Terry loved life and lived life to its fullest. Even when her many physical problems worsened, she never gave up. We will all miss her.

Eulogy to Terry by Pat Henderson

I am Pat Henderson and I am an international and Israeli dancer who lives in Orlando. I have known Terry since she came to Florida in both the dance families. She was my best friend after my husband and we made a great team planning and running our annual Florida Folk Dance Council Winter Workshop affectionately known as camp. It was a four day, three night event. Terry has the record of 13 years as President in the 53 year old organization. For six of those years, I was President and she was another officer which kept her involved. We were the first ones to put the camp registration on a computer spreadsheet and bring a computer and printer to camp. We were the ones who moved the camp from Silver Springs Conference Center to hotels in the Orlando area where we have met since 2010. Her last camp as President was in February 2020 right before the pandemic. She was the one who made our flyers for publicity for the camp and the flings, made our name buttons for camp and usually designed the camp T-shirt. We always looked forward to her camp parody that she would sing put to a tune of a folk dance. So you can see that she is irreplaceable.

Terry was more than a dancing friend to my husband, Bobby, and I. She came to some of our party nights at our international dance group in Orlando. For over 25 years, our group has met in a studio that our group built behind our home. Of course, she had to spend the night and then we fed her eggs from our chickens the next morning. She really loved that.

In our Israeli dance world, Terry would join us on a trip to Karmiel USA every Labor Day weekend in either north Georgia or Highlands, North Carolina. Again, she would write and sing a parody about the experience to the tune of one of our dances. Then, for many years, our Orland group under the leadership of Debbie Meitin, would host an Israeli dance workshop weekend in and Terry would always come. We even saw her a few times at Machol Miami at the end of the year.

Terry traveled the world and saw many of the countries of our dances. She collected masks and headgear from a lot of them.

Terry was an excellent writer and authored many articles for the Florida Folk Dancer. She always wrote about what was happening in Tampa and she wrote the President's Column for every issue when she was President. Just this year, she wrote a song about my life and sang it when I had a big birthday party on January 6. There were 84 people there. After it was over, I asked her to write an article for the Florida Folk Dancer about my party. It was a fantastic article called, "Pat's Perfect Party." We will miss her very entertaining style of writing.

In closing, I would like to say that her spirit lives on in all of us who knew her. She was the life of the party and had a beautiful smile. Goodbye, dear friend.

Her narrative makes it clear how much she learned from her own life and how her story is built on empathy and resilience. The life lessons woven through should be absorbed and practiced by all."

I have read Ruth's book and the word extraordinary to describe her amazing journey is no exaggeration. I could barely put it down, once I started. We are all "children of our time" and if you were a young woman coming of age in the 70's, you will recognize the truth in her telling of her story. Congratulations Ruth!
