




President's Message

Hello everyone,

I have just about recovered from our wonderful weekend at the Ramada, and was gratified that so many of you told me what a good time you had. I tried to vary the program to strike a balance between learning and leisure, and can still picture the music jams and the happy parties scattered around the courtyard each afternoon - something I don't remember from previous weekends. Many of us worked very hard to make this weekend happen, and Eva, especially, struggled for weeks with the uncertainties of registration during a pandemic.



I always judge weekends by the number of dances we are likely to do when we get home, and I could see some groups doing every one of them - amazing! It was great to see all the former leaders and hear their stories of past meetings.

Which leads to your vote to find a better venue for next year. People's biggest complaint seemed to be the traffic; a reality we have to deal with in a state that's growing faster than its infrastructure. Can you think of one place that doesn't have problems with traffic? Cities with a good grid system and synchronized lights, like St. Petersburg, are better than Orlando. But you have to get to them, and most hotels with meeting rooms are where the traffic is, in the center of things. I have racked my brain for centrally located, special venues, such as Mount Dora, which might be better about traffic (if you don't try to go west from there). Lakeland, for instance, with no hotel with a meeting room large enough for us, has a traffic jam on I-4 almost every time you pass it.

Some comic notes: The Safety Harbor Resort and Spa, a piece of easily accessible heaven with affordable rooms, declined to give me a proposal because their largest meeting room is 3700 square feet. "And you cannot possibly get a 1600 square foot dance floor in that space." Maybe a stream from one of their mineral springs runs through it. In the Don Cesar, a famous landmark in St. Pete Beach, the lowest price room I could find was \$331 per night. I am talking to the Florida Convention Center at the Florida Mall, but just remembered that the Florida Mall is a big step down from the Millenia Mall, and traffic will be much worse there.

FFDC 2022 Annual Camp



Camp Summary by Pat Henderson

FFDC held its 2022 Winter Workshop on February 11-14 at the Ramada Gateway in Kissimmee. We had 64 people attend for any or all of the weekend activities. Lee Otterholt and Marcella Lawson from California were our teachers. They taught 16 dances over the weekend which were from several countries. They brought their instruments and guess what happened! We had a jam session each day for those who also brought instruments to form a band. The band played several songs on Saturday and Sunday at the night parties. It was wonderful for the dancers to dance around them.

We had a display of the timetable of FFDC events over its 50 years. The timetable also included the name of whomever was current president during those events.

Several clubs brought their scrapbooks and we had a memorial table for those we have lost.

We had our annual membership meeting on Saturday following lunch. And on Sunday following lunch, there was a program celebrating 50 years of FFDC.

Andy Pollock once again used the requested dances by those who registered to tailor great programs for the dancing at the night parties. We can't wait until we can do it again next year!

FFDC 50th Anniversary Program, Sunday, February 13 by Pat Henderson

As part of our weekend workshop, FFDC celebrated its 50th anniversary with a program after lunch on Sunday. The panel was made up of Judith Baizan, Gary Berke, Terry Abrahams, Pat Pieratte, Pat Henderson, Dorothy Archer (for David Digby), Larry Wartell, and Kelly Fagan. Gary introduced the program and gave Judith and Dorothy certificates for being founding members of FFDC. Then information on the founding and history of FFDC was shared by the panel. Here is a summary version of FFDC history:

1. Cubby and Jeanie Whitehead danced in New York with the Hermans before moving to Florida in the late 1960s. There were several groups already dancing in Florida - then in Miami, Tallahassee, Gainesville, Tampa, and Sarasota (where he lived). When he discovered that he missed the Hermans coming for a weekend of dance in Miami, he vowed to make sure it did not happen again.
2. In either late 1971 (according to David Digby) or April 1972 (according to a typed document in our newsletters), the following founders met at the home of Gretel Dunsing: Judith and Ernesto Baizan, Donna Pezdek, David Digby, Nelle Westergard, Gretel Dunsing, Jeanie and Cubby Whitehead. They decided to form an organization to share folk dance events statewide.
3. The new organization was patterned after the Chicago Folk Dance Council and each group would have two votes at the meetings. This was eventually changed sometime in the 1990s so that all members could vote.
4. In the early years, groups in the various cities would host a workshop and some familiar names who came were: Dick Crum, Atanas Kolarovski, Yves Moreau, Bora Ozkok, Dennis Boxell, Andor Czompo, Ron Wixman, Mihai David, and Vyts Beliajus.
5. Judith Baizan started the Folkdancefests in Tampa in February, 1975. This was a stage show where the folk dance groups would perform in costumes to match the countries they were dancing. Usually each group picked two countries to represent. These occurred in Tampa, Tallahassee, Daytona Beach, and Orlando over the next 13 years.
6. FFDC, Inc. was incorporated in January 1981.
7. The first President's Day Camp was February 13-16, 1981. We now avoid President's Day weekend since holidays posed a problem with travel and hotels, plus most of the dancers are now retired.
8. The location for camp the longest was the Christian Church Conference Center in Silver Springs found during a road trip by Pat Henderson and Juanita Schockey. Fourteen camps were held there.
9. While at the Christian Conference Center, Pat Henderson and Terry Abrahams used Excel for camp registration and FFDC entered the computer age.
10. Some time in the late 1980s or early 90s, Julius Horvath started the Spring Fling in Ormond Beach and he provided all the food, enough for lunch and dinner. Joan and Wally Washington, along with John Daly, started the Fall Fling in Deland, which was later moved to Melbourne. Last December (2021), it was back in Deland due to Covid restrictions. Later, around 2000, Betty Nehemias and Jan Lathi started the Flagler Fling with a day of dance and a walk on the beach the following day. Gainesville took the lead in 2019 and had a Summer Fling.

11. Camps were moved to hotels in 2008 for two years at the Kenilworth Lodge in Sebring, and then to the Orlando area starting in 2010.
12. Lee Otterholt and Yves Moreau have each come to our camp four times. In 2015, they were the teachers and NFO held its Annual Conference before the weekend.
13. Terry Abrahams has been president 13 years and Pat Henderson for 6 years.

After the panel talked about the history, Gary Berke recognized the FFDC past presidents: Terry Abrahams, Judith Baizan, Mickey Cross, Pat Henderson, Jenneine Lambert, Pat Pieratte, and Andy Pollock. Certificates of Appreciation were presented to them (Mickey Cross, being only available on Friday, received her certificate then). Pat Henderson also presented the same certificate to Gary Berke in recognition of his past and present service.

Then Pat Henderson recognized the following for dancing in the early years of FFDC, 1971-72: Pat Pieratte, Larry Wartell, Bobby Quibodeaux, Morris Rashy, Sheila Rashy, and Teresa Borker.

Kelly and Lynda Fagan sang a fitting closing song about camp and FFDC. It was to the tune of "I'm Dreaming of a White Christmas" and Kelly wrote the lyrics.

Meeting called to order by President Gary Berke at 12:45 pm

1. Gary and Terry shared a song about being President of FFDC.
2. Pat Henderson summarized the minutes which were printed in the March/April 2021 issue of the newsletter. Karen Loudon moved that the minutes be accepted as published in the newsletter. The motion passed.
3. Eva Gaber gave the Treasurer's Report. She gave the balance in the Olga Princi scholarship fund at around \$3,000 and our regular account at around \$6,000. The money collected this year provided for the scholarship awarded. The expenses are more than we expected due mainly to the increase in the cost of food. At the moment, without all the final numbers in for camp income and expenses, it looks like we are short at least \$700.
4. Terry reported that there are a few camp T-shirts still available. She also mentioned that Lee has a table for his and Marcella's music, videos and his T-shirt. She pointed out where the Olga Princi Auction items were located in the same area as Liz Nunan's items for sale and Terry's folk dance buttons.
5. Gary thanked Terry for being the greeter and check-in person yesterday.
6. Gary announced since Lee and Marcella are also musicians, that there are jam sessions in the afternoons for anyone who would like to form a band to play music at the night parties.
7. Pat Pieratte pointed out that there was a table of photo albums for several Florida folk dance groups. Then Pat Henderson described the poster of the history of FFDC with events, camps, and a list of the presidents.
8. Carla Powers read a letter from Jaap describing his regret for not coming for the weekend because of travel restrictions due to Covid.
9. Gary asked if there were concerns about returning to the Ramada Gateway. A few members requested that we search for another hotel. It was suggested to look closer to the Orlando airport.
10. Gary asked if people would come if we charged \$100 more for a better hotel and better floor. More than 50% said yes.
11. Andy Pollock asked if anyone was having trouble getting FFDC member messages. A few raised their hand.
12. Terry asked if others thought we should create a logo for FFDC and it was agreed that we should. Gary suggested that we have a contest and announce it in the next newsletter. We also considered a couple designs from past T-shirts--the Margaret Tolbert design and the one with opanci. Liz Nunan showed the design with three dancers that Atlanta group used as a possibility.
13. Pat Pieratte asked that missing newsletters from the earlier years be put on the website. The website is being redesigned for easier editing and when that is finished, it will be done.
14. Andy Pollock moved to adjourn.

Meeting adjourned at 1:28 pm
