### Why Don't We Dance More? By Melissa Kirsch

Dancing offers an opportunity to use our bodies for something beyond mere practicality.

Remember Snowball, the sulphur-crested cockatoo whose fancy footwork to the Backstreet Boys' "Everybody (Backstreet's Back)" brought him viral fame in 2007? I recently rewatched the video, and it holds up. Here is this bird, perched on the back of a chair. As the song opens, he appears to be sketching out his moves, getting a feel for the song. When the chorus arrives, he shrieks and grooves, he high-kicks and head-bangs, settling into his rhythm, possessed by the beat.

The video of Snowball is astonishing because of how humanlike he is. Look, an animal moving spontaneously to the music, just like we do! Or, rather, just like we can. We can dance, but how often do we, really? Aside from weddings or other milestone occasions, when was the last time you really cut a rug?

We don't dance as much as we could, or as much as we want to, because we're afraid to look foolish. That greeting card exhortation to "dance like no one's watching" caught on for a reason.

When I was in high school, a group of friends and I would regularly park a car in our town's commuter train station parking lot, blast some music from the stereo and dance. There, in one of the weird open spaces suburban teenagers can own after dark, we'd move just to move, trying out our bodies in space, together, before hitting the local diner for grilled cheese.

Those nights were exhilarating, opportunities to turn off our brains and let loose, to express ourselves

physically, outside of the limited vernacular we normally afforded ourselves as self-conscious teenagers.

When you ask people why they don't dance more, they get pensive, maybe a little defensive. They don't have time, they don't have the opportunity, what are they going to do, go to a club? These are people with responsibilities, with jobs and children! Dancing, one person suggested to me sadly, is something you do when you're young and then you stop.

This perception of dancing as unserious, as something frivolous people do, like eating a bowl of whipped cream or sleeping until noon, seems inaccurate, especially once you start deliberately dancing more, as I've tried to lately. I'm not talking about complicated choreography that requires learning moves or executing steps; I mean simply moving spontaneously to music.

If you start looking for opportunities to dance, you find them. While cooking dinner or cleaning the house. Instead of running in place at the crosswalk during a jog. Perhaps a spontaneous living-room disco with your kids. It's sort of miraculous: Each little break offers a little dose of endorphins. A little moment of expression. Of returning to yourself in the midst of an otherwise chaotic life.

We're busy. We're tired. Most of our movement in the course of a day ends up being about utility. We move to get from here to there, to accomplish tasks or as part of an exercise regimen. Dancing is a way of reclaiming movement, of deciding how you want to

use your energy and your body rather than just getting things done.

It's holiday party season. There might be opportunities for dancing, should you wish to avail yourself of them. You could find a dance party, or occupy a parking lot, or a corner of the subway, or just the one square foot of space in front of the sink while you do the dishes. Or, if you need more persuasion before you bust a move, you could watch

the CBC documentary "Why We Dance," a lovely exploration of cultural and evolutionary rationales for dancing. But honestly, you don't need an occasion or a good reason or any reason at all. Put on whatever music makes it impossible for you to sit still (I'm partial lately to "New York Groove" by Ace Frehley) and do your best Snowball (manic screeching optional).





# A Wonderful Wander Through the Christmas Markets of Germany and Austria by Vicki Kulifay

I've always wanted to see and experience the Christmas Markets of Europe so Bernie, my husband, and I finally dug the winter clothes out of the closet and headed east. And about those winter clothes...we only take a small carryon and backpack each when we travel so there certainly were some discerning choices about what was going in that carryon. And I had to make sure there would be room on the flip-flop to bring a few things back. Somehow, I didn't even have to use the expander on the carryon, so this definitely was packing success.

We started our trip in Nuremberg in early December. The main Christkindlesmarkt in Nuremberg was beyond beautiful. We stayed inside the walled city

and tried to visit



its Christmas
Markets was

on our itinerary. There I got my fill of freshly roasted chestnuts. We spent the good part of another day going through the Documentation Center (a sad, fascinating look at the rise of the Nazi Party) and

exploring the Nazi rally grounds. We also visited Courtroom 600 where the Nuremberg trials took place and walked through the history of the



courthouse itself. Courtroom 600 is still used for

court cases, though the layout and design have obviously been modified over the years.

Nuremberg had one unique market we didn't see elsewhere – a partner market. Nuremberg's sister cities from around the world were invited to setup booths: Antalya (Turkey), Cordoba (Spain), Kharkiv (Ukraine), Glasgow (Scotland), Hadera (Israel), Kavala (Greece), Nice (France), Prague (Czech Republic), San Carlos (Nicaragua), Shenzhen (China), Skopje (North Macedonia) and Venice (Italy) as well as the partner communities Bar (Montenegro), Brasov/Kronstadt (Romania), Gera (Thuringia), Kalkudah (Sri Lanka), Klausen+Montan (Italy), Nablus (Palestine), Santiago (Cuba), Verona (Italy), Corrèze from the region of Limousin (France) and Aného (Togo). So we had a nice journey around the world while sipping hot gluhwein.

Our next stop was Munich - which almost got

derailed due to a rail strike. With the rail gods blessing us, we got seats on the only train running from Nuremberg to Munich on

the day of



the strike. While in Munich, we started with a day trip to Schloss Neuschwanstein, the "Disney" Castle. A beautiful setting due to the recent snowfall in the area, but that also meant the transport up to the castle wasn't running so we had to hike up. And while the iconic Maria bridge was closed due to the snow, we still have some incredible views of the countryside. Another day trip was to Dachau (one of the first and longest running former concentration camps in Nazi Germany). This was the coldest, wettest, windiest day of the whole trip – perhaps fitting as we spent a good part of the tour (with an excellent tour guide) on the outside grounds and

could only imagine the horrors which took place there.

It was in Munich where we started the Rick Steve's

(RS)tour portion of our winter adventure. A walking tour of Munich's Christmas Markets (too many to count and just as beautiful as Nuremberg's). We saw an annual Krampus run in Marienplatz, had a fabulous walking tour of Munich, drank more gluhwein

and lots of dunkel beer, and enjoyed the best of Bavarian cuisine.

After leaving Munich and crossing the border into

Austria, the bus got off the autobahn and drove over rolling hills with immaculate homes, farmlands, and green countryside with scattered patches of snow. We stopped at the Trumer Welt Brewery (since 1601, eight generations owned) where we toured and tasted.



That was followed by a visit to a family dairy farm which specializes in all natural cheeses, where we met the cows and sampled the cheeses. The next morning, we took a walk through historic Salzburg and scoped out the locations of their Christmas Markets. We also had a grand adventure making strudel at the Edelweiss Cooking School.



Besides thinking of Mozart's birthplace and Julie Andrew singing Do-Re-Mi, this city with snowy Alps in the background is charming and quaint.

On a side note, our RS guide kept us well plied with local sweets and other "beverages" along the route. One of the joys of a RS tour.

On our way to Hallstatt, we stopped in Bad Ischl to

see the imperial summer home of Emperor/King Franz Joseph I and Elizabeth of Austria, known as Susi. A desk inside is where Joseph signed the declaration that kicked off WWI. It is still in the original location in the villa. No photos were permitted inside the villa, as it is the residence of their great-grandson, Archduke Markus Emanuel Salvator.

When we got to Hallstatt, you could immediately tell how it is an "instagrammers" paradise, much to the chagrin of the locals. The locals have been known to block tour bus routes to

prevent daytrippers, as some outsiders believe the town provided the visual ideas for the movie "Frozen." Not true, but that





doesn't stop people from coming. Hallstatt is a UNESCO

anointed, fairy tale village noted for its production of salt. Since buses are not permitted in the city center, so we actually got off the bus onto a small boat,

which, after a cruise around the lake. delivered us to a dock close to our hotel. The local salt mine is in active production, and is also a very old archaeological showcase. We spent 1.5 hours on a tour deep inside the mountain learning about how the salt deposits were created, the history of the mining, and the high-tech salt





processing of today. Our tour guide constantly encouraged us to sample the salt on the walls of the tunnels. The

tour was made a lot more exciting when we slid down slides used by the miners to access the lower levels. Our ride was probably a lot smoother and a lot more fun!

On our way to Vienna, we stopped at the 15th century Melk Abbey, which towers over the Danube River. We discovered an architectural marvel with an incredible church and a library that looked like it belonged in Hogwarts. No photos were permitted. The motto of the abbey to this day is still "pray, work, and read." The oldest resident monk is currently 92.

We spent our first day in Vienna viewing a vast array of artifacts related to the international film classic "The Third Man" filmed in 1948 in Vienna. The museum is the place to go not only for film fans, but also for those interested in the postwar history of Vienna. The museum is the life-long project of

Gerhard Strassgschwandtner, who actually met our group at the hotel and walked us to the museum. "The Third Man" is shown somewhere in Vienna every week, so as a cult classic, is very much alive.



Afterwards we visited the Kunsthistorisches Museum, which is the largest art museum in the country.

We visited at least six different Christmas Markets and put countless steps walking this magnificent city.

So all told, a splendid trip. All the planes took off and landed on time. No one got sick. And I came home with memories galore, a few Christmas ornaments. and a desire to go back in warmer weather!
